## Programme

Medley from Cats - Andrew Lloyd-Webber & Thomas Stearns Eliot, arr. Ed Lojeski

Cats premiered in the West End in 1981, with music by Lloyd-Webber and words from TS Eliot's Old Possum's Book of Practical Cats, which was published in 1939. It transferred to Broadway in 1982, and is the second longest-running show in Broadway history. It's the fourth longest-running West End show, having closed on its 21st birthday in 2002. The show details the antics of the Jellicle Cats - who by day are just common cats but who by night have completely different lives. In this medley we hear about Old Deuteronomy, the Jellicle Patriarch - an ancient, wise cat, Skimbleshanks: The Railway Cat, Macavity: The Mystery Cat, and magical Mr Mistoffelees, the original conjuring cat. We also hear the famous Memory, sung sadly by Grizabella, a one-time glamour cat who is now a shell of her former self.

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Medley from My Fair Lady - Frederick Loewe & Alan Jay Lerner, arr. Carl Strommen

My Fair Lady is based upon Pygmalion, a play by George Bernard Shaw. The title relates to one of Shaw's provisional titles for Pygmalion, "Fair Eliza", and alludes to the nursery rhyme London Bridge is falling down. The show premiered on Broadway in 1956 and was a great hit, transferring to London, being made into a film, and having numerous revivals. Tonight's medley showcases all of the best tunes from the story of the London flower-girl turned society belle.

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Medley from Oklahoma! - Richard Rodgers & Oscar Hammerstein II, arr. John Leavitt

Oklahoma! is the first collaboration between the hugely successful duo Rodgers and Hammerstein. Both men had previously enjoyed commercial success with other partners, but nothing like the success they achieved together. The opening of Oklahoma! on Broadway in 1943 marked a revolution in musical theatre, introducing a number of new storytelling elements and techniques, including using song and dance to convey plot and character, rather than just as diversions, as had previously been the case.

Medley of Gershwin songs - George & Ira Gershwin, arr. Carl Strommen

Our Gershwin medley this evening is slightly different from the others because it's not based on any particular show. Rather, it's a fast-paced romp through a whole selection of Gershwin songs. It's a bit like hooked-on-Classics - you have just enough time to recognise each song before you're on to the next one! The first show that George and Ira wrote together, in 1924, was Lady Be Good, from which we hear two snippets tonight, but the earliest song included in this medley is Swanee, which actually has lyrics written by Irving Caesar. The other snippets in the medley come from other shows that George and Ira wrote together: Oh, Kay!, Funny Face, Strike up the Band, Show Girl, Girl Crazy and Let 'em eat cake. The famous Summertime is from Porgy and Bess, a folk opera that was the brothers' most ambitious composition.

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Medley from Chicago - Fred Ebb & John Kander, arr. Ed Lojeski

Chicago opened on Broadway in 1975. Its revival in 1996 is the longest-running Broadway revival and is still going strong now. In 2002 it was made into a hugely successful musical film with an all-star cast. Chicago is based on a 1926 play of the same name by Chicago Tribune reporter Maurine Dallas Watkins, about actual criminals and crimes on which she reported. The plot centres around chorus-girl Roxie Hart and vaudevillian Velma Kelly, and is a story of murder, crime and the benefits of having a slick lawyer. The music evokes Prohibition-era America in its mixture of jazz, swing and ragtime.

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Medley from Les Misérables - Claude-Michel Schönberg & Alain Boublil, with Herbert Kretzmer, arr. Ed Loieski

Based on Victor Hugo's 1862 novel of the same name, Les Misérables was composed in 1980 with a French libretto. Herbert Kretzmer wrote the English adaptation, and it opened in the West End in 1985. Still running now, it is the longest-running musical in the world. Set in post-revolution Paris, the plot follows the stories of many characters who strive for redemption and revolution, aided by a cast which includes prostitutes, student revolutionaries and factory workers. Many of the songs have become famous in their own right, but arguably the most famous these days is I dreamed a dream, which was used by Susan Boyle as her audition piece for Britain's Got Talent in 2009. The youtube clip of that performance, has, as I write, had around 85 million viewings.
